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SENATOR OJODU CHARGES NIGERIAN YOUTHS TO TAKE OVER POWER AND TRANSFORM NIGERIA

...As UNIOSUN College of Humanities and Culture holds Annual College Lecture

ne of the foremost Nigerian Journalists, former Senator from the Ekiti Central Constituency and current Senior Special Adviser to the President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria on Political Affairs, Senator Babafemi Ojodu, on Tuesday, 5th July, 2022 charged Nigerian youths to take over leadership roles and transform the country. Senator Ojodu made this statement while delivering a lecture titled "The Nigerian Youths in the Emerging Democratic Order" at the 2022 annual lecture of the University's College of Humanities and Culture, Ikire campus.

According to the Guest Lecturer, for youths to take over power and play sterling roles in the politics of the nation, it is imperative for them to understand the dynamics of our society. He noted that a better picture for Nigeria was the underlying motive of the paper, which he claimed could only be achieved through the inclusion of youths in critical positions in Government.

Senator Ojodu theorized the concept of "a subtle and larger takeover strategy", where the younger generation gradually unseat the status quo in a takeover that has got to be subtle and gradual. He traced the emergence of godfatherism to Nigeria's First Republic, a major syndrome that characterised the three major political parties: Ahmadu Bello's Northern People's Congress, Herbert Macaulay and Nnamdi Azikiwe's National Council of


Nigeria and the Cameroons and Chief Obafemi Awolowo's Action Group.

While speaking about political apathy among youths, Senator Ojodu counseled the youths to organize themselves in large numbers and join major political parties at the early stage so as to acquire the needed political experience before running for major political offices. Having registered as members of political parties, he advised the youths further to overwhelm the older generation with contemporary ideas of governance and expose them to modern ways of doing things.

In his earlier remarks, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor 'Ayo Clement Adebooye, ably represented by the Deputy Vice-

Chancellor (Academic, Research, Innovations and Partnerships), Professor Anthony Kola-Olusanya, welcomed the Guest Lecturer and all guests to the University and the College. He then proceeded to intimate the gathering with some historical details about the University and the Ikire Campus. He specially commended Senator Babafemi Ojudu for honouring the University's invitation in spite of his other numerous engagements.

The Provost of the College, Professor Temitope Balogun, and the Dean, Professor Rotimi Fasan, jointly presented a Distinguished Guest Lecturer Award to Senator Babafemi Ojodu for the thought-provoking lecture, while other awards were presented by the Vice-Chancellor to past and current Provosts and Deans of the College.





he Pro-Chancellor and Chairman of Council of Osun State University, Mallam Yusuf Olaolu Ali, SAN, on Thursday, 28th July, 2022, turned the first sod of the Peter Ishola Office Complex, at the institution's College of Humanities and Culture, Ikire.










UNIOSUN INDIGENT STUDENTS RECEIVE TUITION SUPPORT FROM NGO



Mojoro Faith, a 300 level student of the Department of Food Science and Technology, and Nureni Habeeb, a final year student of the Department of Political Science and International Relations were awarded scholarships of a hundred thousand naira each (N100,000) by the foundation.

Speaking at the office of the Vice-Chancellor where delegates from the foundation were received, the Founder and President of the NGO and an alumnus of the University, Mr. Joshua Aluko, said that the mission of the foundation is to put an end to the epidemic of "dropout" among undergraduates in higher institutions. According to him, the foundation "not only fast tracks the





selflessness in them."

He further revealed that the foundation had granted financial assistance to 1,232 students in various tertiary institutions around the country since its inception in 2015, and intended to support 500 more students before the end of the year. To back up his claim that the foundation was granting employment to some of the graduates from the University, he offered Nureni Habeeb employment within the foundation upon completion of his course of study and observing the one year mandatory National Youth Service programme.

The Vice-Chancellor, Professor 'Ayo Clement Adebayo, in his



remarks expressed his happiness and satisfaction with the good works of the foundation, especially as the support initiative was spearheaded by an alumnus of the University. The Vice-Chancellor commended the foundation and its President, and charged him to use his foundation to positively influence Nigerian youths, especially so that they could change their mindset about, and attitude towards the nation.

"Our generation has caused a lot of havoc to this country. However, the youths are the only ones who can make the change we all clamour for. They need to start taking their rightful place as leaders of today not tomorrow. You are already doing your bit, however, I implore you to ignite their spirit to work towards salvaging the nation," the Vice-Chancellor added.





...as College of SET holds Annual Lecture in honour of pioneer Provost.

Experts have recommended the domestication of the knowledge of Artificial Intelligence in Nigeria for the nation to meet up with first-world countries.

The experts explained that government, academia, Community and the Private sector (the Quadruple Helix) must come together to rejuvenate Artificial Intelligence knowledge in the nation. They echoed this during the annual lecture of the College of Science, Engineering and Technology of Osun State University, themed "Harnessing Artificial Intelligence in Nation Building: The Role of Private Partnership in Higher Education and Research", which was held in honour of its pioneer Provost,

Professor Oladiran Famurewa, at the institution's Auditorium in Osogbo, on Thursday, 21st July, 2022.

The Guest Lecturer, a Professor of Mechatronics, and Vice-Chancellor of Summit University, Offa, Professor Abiodun Musa Aibinu, while delivering his paper titled "Harnessing Artificial Intelligence in Nation Building Using Quadruple Helix", stated that Nigerian universities must not only generate money, but they must also generate knowledge to solve community problems and students must learn to solve community problems.

The Guest Lecturer, who is also an expert in Artificial Intelligence and Robotics explained that Nigeria needs to evolve from user to developer and rejuvenate artificial intelligence by looking into



curriculum and implementation.

According to him, Lecturers who are to implement the curriculum should get themselves ready for the job to build problem-solving graduates.

"Some years ago, you needed to go to computer school or training before you know how to operate a computer, but now, you can make use of computers without going to any school. We need to go beyond user to developer, we need to rejuvenate, and look into our curriculum and the way we implement it." the Guest Lecturer added.

Also speaking through Zoom, the Director, Craobh Technology Consulting, and Lecturer, Department of Computing, Atlantic Technological University, Ireland, Dr. Ruth Lennon, in the course of unraveling her paper titled "Public/Private Partnership: Meeting Industry DevOps and Cloud Skill Requirements in Tertiary Education", urged domain

experts (lecturers) to help students in research to get to the level where they could make significant change in the society.

In the same vein, the Head of Information Technology, National Institute of Occupational Health, Johannesburg, South Africa, Dr. Olalekan Samuel Ogunleye, noted that harnessing the power of AI would transform Nigeria into a smart nation. He stressed the importance of developing a data dam in the country and encouraged the adoption of a multi-stakeholder approach.

Earlier in his remarks, the Provost, College of Science, Engineering and Technology, Professor Amos Popoola said the lecture had become an annual ritual with the sole aim of bringing experts to educate the public on how to improve the nation.

In his words, "Nigeria as a country has enormous societal problems and developmental challenges. We have realised that in nation building, we need to deploy artificial intelligence. As a college and community of scholars, we decided to annually bring experts to the college lecture to educate the public on ways to improve our nation."



UNIOSUN DON OUTLINES WAYS TO MITIGATE SUDDEN DEATHS

...As Faculty of Clinical Sciences holds faculty lecture

Professor of Pediatric Ophthalmology and Dean of the Faculty of Clinical Sciences of Osun State University, Professor Michaeline Isawumi, on Wednesday, 6th July, 2022 identified some ways to avoid sudden deaths among intellectuals and other groups of people in the society. He revealed these while delivering the Faculty of Clinical Sciences lecture titled "Sudden Death among Intellectuals", an event held at the 750-Lecture Theatre of the University's College of Health Sciences, Isale-Osun, Osogbo.

The Lecturer recommended cessation of cigarette smoking and alcohol intake, regular exercising, healthy eating, regular medical checkups, among others as key steps to take to avoid sudden deaths. He maintained that the lifespan of man is higher in developed countries than third world nations, and citing relevant authorities, he confirmed that

Nigeria was one of the countries with very low life expectancy with an average life expectancy of 55.75, which is proportional to her income level

She established that sudden death is mostly associated with cardiac diseases and highlighted some causes of sudden death to include accidents which could be road traffic or domestic, diseases such as diabetes mellitus and cardiovascular diseases, blood clot medically known as embolus, hypertension which could be primary or secondary, stroke, epilepsy, respiratory disorders, obstetrics and gynaecological problems, stress and occupational hazards, among numerous others.

Immediately after the impactful lecture that thrilled the audience, a plaque was presented to the Faculty Lecturer by the Chairman, Osun State House of Assembly Committee on Health, Honourable Elizabeth Adenike Abioye as a

token of appreciation. A goodwill message was thereafter delivered by the Chief Medical Director of UNIOSUN Teaching Hospital, Professor Peter Olaitan.

Earlier in his remarks, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor 'Ayo Clement Adebooye, who was represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic, Research, Innovations and Partnerships), Professor Anthony Kola-

Olusanya, commended the Faculty and the College at large for coming up with a fascinating lecture at a this trying time to educate the people on ways to mitigate sudden death. He further advised all staff of the University to avoid unnecessary stress and ensure they all make use of their leaves to rest and enjoy with their loved ones.

Both the Chief Executive Officers of Osogbo Central Hospital, Dr. Akin Ajayi and of Just Snails Farms, Mr. Femi Oludare Roland, who were present at the occasion charged the participants to henceforth be thinking outside the box and start solving problems in the society.



While presenting his paper titled "Vision and Strategy: Keys to a sustainable entrepreneurship", Dr. Ajayi harped on entrepreneurship and sustainability, highlighting good customer relations and longevity as ways to sustain entrepreneurship. 
